Founded by three Ukrainian women shortly after Russia's February 2022 invasion of Ukraine, the idea of sending messages of support and encouragement to the frontline Defenders of Ukraine spread out on Postcrossing.com — an international postcard exchange platform. Branches of Postcards to the Front have been established in Australia, Canada and United Kingdom.

Defender personnel, including medics, mechanics, drivers, cooks, etc., receive postcards in their care packages. While each bit of happy mail makes a huge difference in the psychological well-being of the front line Defenders, messages and pictures from children are especially heartwarming. Your support makes a difference. Thank you!

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What postcards mean ...

Like many Canadians, Jean-Michel and I were appalled by the full-scale invasion of Ukraine on February 24, 2022. Immediately, we found ways to send financial support. We then reached out to people we knew in Ukraine to offer support. And, as a member of Postcrossing, I revisited connections I had made with Ukrainian Postcrossers by sending postcard messages of support to them.

Over the past two years, I have been sending monthly messages of support to 40 Ukrainian friends and Postcrossing friends. I have not included my return address because I didn't want people to feel that they needed to write back. They had enough to do to survive. I just wanted them to know that someone 'out there' cared.

This was a visceral response to my need to do something personal and meaningful when

faced with something senseless and horrific.

By the time the first anniversary since the invasion screamed from my calendar, I had to do more. That's when Jean-Michel and I reached out to Tamara in Zaporizhzhia to ask if we could establish a Canada branch of Postcards to the Front.

Here we are, another year later, and the journey to victory grinds on. Lives are disrupted. Lives are lost. Cities have been razed.

And ... life goes on. Under a reign of mighty terror.

With determination and resilience, Ukrainians are standing their ground. And, they need our support.

Some of the correspondents have reached out to me with notes of thanks for my support, either digitally, or by sending their own postcards. Naturally, friendships have developed.




Figure 1: "Dear Ukraine" postcard sent to Helen's monthly correspondents for February 24th anniversary. Designed by katemargoli at redbubble.com.

Just days before publication of this issue of the *Postcards to the Front* newsletter, I received the following messages from one such new friend in Ukraine. She, like me, is the mother of sons. Sons that she has 'given' to the front lines.

Liudmyla has allowed me to share these words with you. What she feels and sees around her as she marks the 2nd anniversary since the invasion by joining a 'charity tour': to see the front lines for herself. And this was no February anniversary picnic in a park!

No, Liudmyla was determined to know the full extent of what her people – her sons – are living through. Brave and unafraid to face the horror. A witness to the crime that many are calling a genocide.

And when she uses the word 'you', I take it to mean "all of us" who support Ukraine.

That's you, too. Thank you!

Hello dear Helen!



Thank you very much for your great support of Ukraine! I read how much you do for us. How much effort and energy you put into meetings and coverage of events. On the Internet, in the news, we see that Canada and other countries go to rallies in support of Ukraine, go to Russian diplomatic institutions [to protest]. You are incredible! You are great people! 💗

I tell my sons, relatives and work colleagues about you. People are very happy and grateful for the support. Sometimes we feel strong and stable, but sometimes from nervous tension we fall into disappointment. We are afraid that Russia is still stronger and larger in the number of its madmen who go under bullets on orders.

Then we remember our grandparents, who survived the Second World War, and again begin to believe that we will endure and live on.

On February 24, 2024, it was two years since Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine, and I went on a charity tour to the Kyiv region, namely to the places where the attackers - Bucha, Vorzel, and Makariv - penetrated.

We saw there a lot of scrap metal from gas stations, a destroyed shopping center that burned down from explosions, many houses are still standing destroyed and not restored. Perhaps they have not been restored because their owners are no longer alive. It was scary to see. My heart sank, and tears flowed by themselves.

On the side of one road, we saw a lot of rusty Russian military equipment, which our soldiers stopped on the approaches to Kyiv. There are many forests and fields in which there are mines, and it is dangerous and forbidden to leave the road. There are red flags everywhere, indicating danger. Miners are working there now, we saw them from the road.

I told my eldest son about it. He was near those places at the beginning of the invasion and saw it personally. And he told me that in the south of Ukraine, in the Kherson region, where he participated in the liberation, the situation is even worse. Many settlements were destroyed. And in the Donetsk region, where he was also, in general, Armageddon, like in horror films about the apocalypse.

It cannot be expressed in words.

Even as I stood and saw the destroyed houses with my own eyes, my brain could not understand how people could do such a thing? It does not fit in the head.

Helen, at the same time I want to let you know that I received a lovely card from you today. It is like an engraving with Ukrainian landscapes. How I love my country and these my favorite landscapes. What a great card back design! Thank you very much for the joy you bring, for the great support and sincere words of the soul!

Warm hugs and best wishes from our family!

When I asked Liudmyla if we could publish her message, this is her response –

Dear Helen,

I thank you for your kind heart and your actions to help Ukraine! Yes, of course I agree to publish what I wrote. I want people to know and understand that war is terrible, that Russia is doing terrible things.

I live in a town that is not on the front line, but a week ago a rocket hit the fuel storage tanks near us. It all burned for three days and I personally saw it. And two days ago, a shot down rocket fell very close to my house, destroyed two houses and damaged several houses nearby. We felt the walls of our house shaking.

This is our reality.

Russia bombs the civilian population and destroys everything it can reach.

I just read that Denmark is sending its "entire artillery" to Ukraine, the Danish prime minister has said. Speaking at the Munich Security Conference, Mette Frederiksen appealed to other European nations to do more. 'They are asking us for ammunition now. Artillery now. From the Danish side, we decided to donate our entire artillery,' she said. It's as Russia said it has taken full control of the eastern Ukrainian city of Avdiivka, its biggest gain since capturing Bakhmut last May, after a retreat by Ukrainian troops.

This is what I call support for Ukraine. As a representative of a Ukrainian volunteer group can I send you and the Danish Government the thanks of *Postcards to the Front Australia* members for such generous support.




Figure 3: Cards available at the Australia Branch.

Saskatchewan artist reflects on Ukraine in postcard design

Although I have lived in Regina, Saskatchewan, my entire life, I remember many stories about my grandparents who immigrated to Canada from Ukraine.

They arrived in Saskatchewan in the late 1800's with a promise of 160 acres of farmland for \$10. It was winter. Wood was set on fire to warm the land enough to dig a hole to live in and survive until spring when they could clear trees, cultivate the land, and plant crops.

I believe Ukrainian people are strong, courageous and resilient to this day.

The Russia/Ukraine war has entered its third year. World focus has shifted to the war between Israel and Hamas. Defenders of Ukraine need to feel our support and to know that they are not forgotten.

Not knowing what I could do to show my support, I searched online and was pleased to find *Postcards to the Front*.



Three years ago, I had to leave my employment due to serious health issues. I started a home-based business called *Prairie Reflections Cards* to allow me an opportunity to be of service during times when my health permitted. The majority of my work is not-for-profit and a labor of love. It is my small way of being of service and making a difference.

I created a postcard that I hope is both beautiful and meaningful to the Defenders who receive it. I chose to adorn the map of Ukraine with anenomes. While white anemones are common in wooded areas of Ukraine, the purple/blue and yellow ones are rare and special. The peace dove carries kalyna berries. These berries come from the Snowball Viburnum plant which is quite common in Ukraine. This plant is often planted just outside the home because the flower is thought to bring good health and fortune to the family. These red berries have long served as a metaphor for Ukrainian nationhood and independence.

Canada Branch News and Updates

February has been a busy time for Canada branch. We've met hundreds of Canadians who have written messages of support to Ukraine. We hear many stories that describe motivation for writing to Defenders, so far away.

There are the obvious connections to roots. Ukrainian roots. Slavic roots. Eastern European roots.

There are those who recount their own family experiences – and even personal experiences – living in a war zone. In modern times, not just as far back as World War II. Veterans. Civilians.

For instance, one woman shared about her experiences living in Ireland during the Troubles, and how it is too easy — and painful — for her to relate to the fears that everyone in Ukraine lives with daily. She knows. And she is particularly concerned about the impacts of the invasion on children and women. Now, and in the long term.

Some share their concern for the land, for pets and for wildlife, for the need to get grain to Africa.

There is a palpable fear that Ukraine is not the end of Russia's effort. What of Europe? Where is all of this going to take us in one more year, two years, five years?

There are many more 'good' reasons to support Ukraine.

The majority tell us of a pressing need to do something beyond financial support (which many already commit to). Postcard warriors want to make a personal connection. To tell Defenders – all of Ukraine – that they care, and that they see a clear injustice in russia's invasion and war.

Yes, Canadians want to do something meaningful for Ukraine.

Which is why so many joined the global Day of Action on Saturday, February 24 to rally in support of Ukraine. Two years since the invasion. Not an anniversary any of us want to 'celebrate'.

We joined, and set up space for rally participants to write postcard messages of support to Defenders, and to sign a flag to a front line brigade.

It's imperative that we continue to show our support to Ukraine. We cannot abandon Ukraine now. Our support is needed. Weapons are most needed, of course. But a handwritten messages of support goes a long way to boost morale for the hard job of defending land and culture.

A year-end national poll found that the majority of Canadians, after nearly two years, continue to support Ukraine's defense for democracy and freedom. Good job all!

If your MP, or other political representatives, are not responding to your support for Ukraine, write to them and remind them: we have a long history as brothers and sisters. This does not end now. See below, for a sample letter.



February highlights for Canada branch

We were invited to meet with the members of St. John the Baptist Ukrainian Orthodox Church, in Oshawa, Ontario on February 11 to discuss the project to support Defenders. Church members included some Ukrainian families seeking refuge in Canada. We met the newly crowned Miss Odesa 2024. Meghan, and many other young members of the congregation, wrote heartwarming postcard messages. It is always gratifying to meet young people full of energy, enthusiasm and hope. Particularly, one such as Meghan, who is an aspiring educator just starting her university studies.

Last autumn, we met some members of the *Toronto Postcard Club* during our two days of postcard-writing in Merrickville, Ontario, and they invited us to share about *Postcards to the Front* with the larger membership. On Sunday, February 18th, we met with the group via Zoom. What a pleasant surprise to meet individuals from across Canada and into the United States whose interest was beyond postcards. Within a week of this presentation, we received an envelope of postcards from one member, living in Cape Breton, Nova Scotia. Another member joined us at the February 24th Day of Action rally in Oshawa, as well as wrote postcards and signed the flag for Defenders. We were grateful to receive a donation from this member for postage stamps. As with other groups that we meet, members offered helpful suggestions for us to reach out to other organizations in their communities, and to spread the word about this project.

In Ontario, where we live, the third Monday of February is a statutory holiday: **Family Day**. On Monday, February 19, we met with members of St. Matthews Anglican Church in Oshawa, Ontario, who were keen to learn about this project, who wrote many postcards for Defenders, and who generously shared ideas and suggestions to meet with other groups. Many brought stamps to help fund the shipment of postcard packages. Awesome! A few days later, when I took a package to the post office for shipment, the clerk expressed surprise at the stamps which she had never seen before ... they dated some decades back. A little bit of history traveling to Ukraine!





Figure 8: Writing postcards using Ukrainian phrases.

Our final event this month was an invitation from a collective of Oshawa's Ukrainian community, spanning several faith groups, educational and cultural organizations, to join them on the global *Day of Action* to support Ukraine; *Saturday*, *February 24*. The day began with a rally at the Albert Street bridge, over Canada's busiest Highway 401 (the Highway of Heroes). The community has been demonstrating every Sunday at this location since the full-scale invasion.













Following the rally, there were prayers in St. George's Ukrainian Catholic Church, speeches and the sharing of information about events in Ukraine, a poignant film, all followed by refreshments, postcard-writing and flag-signing. The signed Canada/Ukraine flag is on its way to a Brigade at the front lines. It symbolizes our solidarity with our sisters and brothers in Ukraine.

We met many individuals from the local community and beyond. Long-standing 3rd and 4th generation Ukrainians in the community, as well as recent newcomer Ukrainians sheltering in Canada. Toddlers to nonagenarians. All walks of life, including Willie Woo, Councillor with the Region of Durham. And Brandon, who did a tour in Ukraine last autumn, and who is now preparing to return for further training in the United States this summer, followed by deployment to the front lines in August. When asked what motivated him to volunteer, the young man responded plainly, "It's the right thing to do."

The Oshawa *Day of Action* group organized the production and printing of their own postcards. First, there is the image of Albert Street rally participants who have stood by Ukraine, every week since the invasion two years ago, along with a message on the back — and room for personal messages — explaining their long term actions of support. The second postcard has the text on the image side stating in Ukrainian and English:



ми не забуваємо про вас! — We didn't forget you! / Канада ЗА вас — Canada Stands with you! / Слава Україні! — Glory to Ukraine!

We always read every card sent to Ukraine. As we read through the Day of Action batch of cards, it was like reading through an epic sonnet of deep love and care. Perhaps the writers were channeling Ukrainian poets Tara Shevchenko or Lesya Ukrainka?

The glory of Ukraine,
And a clear light, not a twilight,
Will shine forth anew ...
Brothers, then, embrace each other,
I entreat and pray you!

Many individuals send us blank cards for postcard-writing events, for which we are grateful. This broadens our ability to send Defenders postcards from many regions of Canada, each

one telling a story about some place in Canada. A certain delightful distraction in the trenches!

We also continue to be inspired by those who design their own cards. In past newsletters we've mentioned the work of some card-making friends who turned their craft to postcard-making. Recently, a member of Oshawa's Ukrainian community donated a number of her handcrafted postcards. The first batch has already been written and sent to Ukraine. I am excited to present her second batch to our next group of writers!

Last month, we received an inquiry from Connie in Regina, Saskatchewan, about her design of a postcard for Easter, seen here. We received a bundle of them, and they've already been written and shipped to Ukraine. You can read about Connie's inspiration for the design in an article in this newsletter, "Saskatchewan artist reflects on Ukraine in postcard design". The symbolism of these cards transcends Easter, making these cards beautiful works for any time you want to send support to Ukraine.
